<u>10:00 – 10:50</u> Essential AI Concepts for Composition Teachers and Students

This session will provide a brief overview of key concepts related to artificial intelligence and text generation and provide an overview of popular AI-detection tools, highlighting their functions and limits. Attendees will discuss the ways that they might introduce these AI concepts/tools in their courses and work in groups to discuss their rationales for using or not using detection tools. Attendees will further develop their working vocabulary for text generation software tools and their understanding of the characteristics that AI detections tools measure.

<u>11:00 – 11:50</u> Reimaging Composing and Literacy in An AI Age

This session will provide recent cases of AI use in workplace/public settings and introduce a framework for shared conversation about the ways that AI is impacting literacy development. Attendees will explore the ways that artificial intelligence complicates or complements our existing literacy frameworks and develop activities to support literacy development amid the rise of AI tools. Faculty will leave with new ideas for activities and assignments that engage students in critical examination and/or more informed use of AI-powered tools for writing.

12:00 – 12:30 Lunch Conversation: Student Perspectives on AI

<u>12:30 – 1:15</u> <u>Teacher to Teacher (T2T): Sharing Assignments/Activities for Writing in an AI Age</u>

Since students may be using AI tools across their activities, ALL of our assignments have been thrust into the AI Age whether we like it or not. This session will follow the model used at the Conference on College Composition and Communication in which faculty bring copies of an assignment or activity they would like to share with colleagues. The assignment does NOT need to be AI specific. Participants will share their assignment/activity within a small group for 4-5 minutes and take questions for 3-4 minutes. All faculty will leave with at least four new assignment/activity ideas from colleagues. *This session will be offered in-person and on Zoom.
